

Many people believe that buried treasure is something found only in popular pirate stories or that it's a pot of gold hidden beneath a tree on a far-away island. However, this is not the case. It may surprise you to learn that it is possible to find real treasure. There have been many amazing discoveries in Great Britain.



The Staffordshire Gold Treasure is an excellent example of a major find. Over 5 kilos of gold and 1 kilo of silver items were discovered by a modern-day treasure hunter with a metal detector. We don't know for certain, but the treasure may have been buried by a king in the 7th Century.
