# Before you Start

- 1. This route includes ongoing employer involvement which will be arranged by your training provider or College, for instance work experience placements.
- 2. You can start with a Level 2 and if you don't become employed and move on to an apprenticeship, you can progress to a T Level. If you start directly with a T Level, you can either move on to an accelerated apprenticeship or complete the NVQ to conclude your training.



#### **Technical Qualification**

#### City & Guilds Level 2 qualification:

**8202-20** Level 2 Technical Certificate in Electrical Installation City & Guilds Level 3 qualification:

**8710-32** T Level Electrical and Electronic Equipment Engineering or

8710-33 T Level Electrotechnical Engineering

If you gain employment during your studies you can switch to the Apprenticeship route(s).

If you've already achieved the appropriate Level 2 and Level 3 technical knowledge qualifications, these can be used to reduce the apprenticeship duration.

If you want to progress and train any further you'll need to be working in the industry in order to become a qualified electrician.



If you secure employment and your employer agrees to support your apprenticeship:

You can be employed or self-employed but must be able to demonstrate work experience for evidence gathering and work-based assessment.



### **Apprenticeship Standard**

Your existing knowledge and experience will be accredited against the apprenticeship to reduce the time needed to complete your training.

City & Guilds on-programme apprenticeship qualifications: (Mandatory)

**5357-23** City & Guilds Electrotechnical qualification. or

**5393-03** City & Guilds in Electrotechnical in Dwellings.

To complete your apprenticeship you'll take the AM2S or the AM2D assessment (delivered by NET).

#### NVQ

# City & Guilds NVQ qualifications: (Mandatory)

**2357-13** NVQ Diploma in Installing Electrotechnical Systems and Equipment (Buildings, Structures and the Environment) or

**2357-23** NVQ Diploma in Electrotechnical Services (Electrical Maintenance).



To achieve your qualification, you'll need to take the industry assessment of competence, the AM2 which tests everything you've learned during your training.



#### Qualified electrician

Once you've completed the apprenticeship or the NVQ, you'll be a qualified electrician.

The achievement of the EPAs or the AM2 assessment meet the criteria for an ECS Gold card application.
