COULD THIS BE FOR YOU?

Do you love dogs? Do you enjoy walking? I've found dog sitting a fulfilling job, and I think you will too. Dog sitting involves looking after other people's dogs in your own home, often overnight, and taking them for walks when needed. It can be tiring, but hey, it's fun!

KNOW YOUR DOGS

You must know about popular breeds and their behaviours. For instance, the UK's most popular breed, Labradors, need a lot of attention. Plus, they tend to shed a lot of hair too, so you may find a bit of extra vacuuming added to your workload! Some dogs are more aggressive towards other dogs, so you need to watch out for that. On the other hand, some breeds are happiest just chasing a ball. You have to be able to recognise signs that a dog is unwell. Can you feel scabs on its skin? You should also keep an eye out for clues it is being treated unkindly, such as flinching if you raise your hand to pat its head.

FOLLOW INSTRUCTIONS

Owners will supply you with food for their dog, but you should always check how they want their dog looked after. Are there set meal times, or should a bowl of food be left out all day? Don't be tempted to give the dogs treats, as owners will not like this. Remember that treats can make some dogs unwell. Always make sure there is water available for the dogs.

SETTING UP YOUR BUSINESS

You will find it incredibly helpful to make a business plan. A business plan is a document that contains details of the business, such as goals and expenses, which are important to set out early on. For example, dog sitters sometimes need a van to transport the dogs, and that doesn't come cheap. Another potential expense is dog leads. Advertising your business is also essential.






MAKING MONEY

I bet you're wondering how much a dog sitter earns. Dog sitters can expect to make around £30 per dog each day, sometimes more. The harder you work, the more money you will earn!





LEGAL MATTERS

You don't have to, but getting a business insurance policy gave me peace of mind. Public liability is designed to give protection if a member of the public becomes injured because of your business. The cost varies, but expect at least £100 a year. You'll want to think carefully about this, because it is a lot of money to pay out upfront, but I know I wouldn't want to face a lawsuit if the worst happened!
